REGIONAL SPELLING BEE CHAMPION GOES A LONG WAY

It was with great pleasure and anticipation that I sat nervously in the audience of the State Spelling Bee Finals at the ABC Centre, Ultimo, Sydney on 16 October. Sharon Thio from 4/5 Cassia was participating in the STATE FINAL. Sharon is our first student at Guildford ever to participate at such a high level in a spelling bee final. She was not only representing Guildford

Public but all the students in the South Western Sydney Region after winning the Regional Final.

40 Students from across all New South Wales sat perfectly still waiting the onslaught of the word attack! Sharon breezed through about seven rounds as students one by one were eliminated. Eventually Sharon succumbed to the word "sycamore," the name of a northern hemisphere fig tree.

Congratulations on getting so very close to State Champion. A year 4 girl from Annandale won a short while later on a word that Sharon could have easily spelt had she had the opportunity. It's not so much if you win...it's how you play the game that's important. Sharon you did us all very proud. Congratulations!

Thio! Sharon represented our school in junior division of the state Premier's Spelling Bee final which was held at the ABC Centre, Ultimo in week 6. Students from all over NSW battled it out in the knock-out spelling competition where there was only one winner.

While Sharon was an outstanding competitor, the competition was fierce and she lost out on the word 'sycamore'. Sharon ought to be extremely proud of her achievements in the Premier's Spelling Bee competition this year. She represented GPS with poise, courage and confidence.

The Premier's Spelling Bee is an initiative designed to foster a love of words and spelling and encourage and support literacy development within state-run primary schools around NSW. It provides an opportunity for students to showcase their skills in spelling in a fun and challenging environment.

This year a record 115,455 students from across the State took part in the competition this year from a record 807 schools, making it the largest spelling bee in the country.

TO become a top speller is no piece of cake.

For starters, one must be able to spell words like piety.

A wannabe bee contestant must read the dictionary often, memorise language origins and be alert but not alarmed by homonyms.

Guildford Public School pupil Sharon Thio is well versed in what it takes to be the best in the bee.

She was competing to be the best speller in the state in the Premier's Spelling Bee as the Sun went to print yesterday.

"You have to keep on reading books because that's important in developing your vocabulary and you should try to read the dictionary as often as you can," Sharon, in year 4, said.

The young wordsmith said she practised spelling every evening.

She said one of the most difficult words she had ever encountered — one

that wasn't even on her spelling list — was pharmacological.

But don't fret, she now knows that 14-letter monster off by heart.

And she breezed through the regional finals with the successful spelling of the "easy" word daffodil.

"I always highlight the words I don't know and practise until I know them," Sharon said.

"It doesn't matter what my outcome is in the competition, I'm just going to try my best."

Sharon said she had always loved words and when she's not spelling she loved to write stories and read Harry Potter books.

More than 115,000 primary school students entered the annual statewide competition that was started in 2004. Seventy-eight students made it to the junior and senior state finals held in Pyrmont Ultimo.

Guildford Public School student Lian Yang was also competing in the senior category yesterday.

Fundraising News

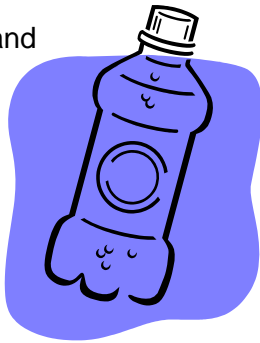

3/4 EUCALYPTUS

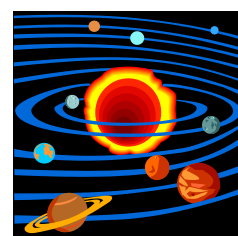
This semester we have been learning about the universe in Science.

HEAD LICE

Head lice is an ongoing problem at school. It is a constant battle to keep this in check at school. **IT IS THE PARENT'S RESPONSIBILITY TO ENSURE THAT THEIR CHILD IS CONSTANTLY FREE OF HEAD LICE SO THAT OTHER CHILDREN ARE NOT BEING INFECTED.** Departmental regulations recommends that children are to be treated with medication from a chemist until ALL THE LICE AND EGGS ARE DEAD AND REMOVED FROM THE HAIR. **Medication will not remove the eggs (attached to the hair) Parents should remove the whole hair strand to remove the egg.** You may decide it necessary to keep your child home until it is treated. It would be appreciated if all parents could check their child's hair in natural sunlight at least once a week, every week.
